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It may be deep into the fall event season, but there are still a slew of not-to-miss occasions to put on your list. Southlake's Naturally Sweet party is one of the season's best and is scheduled for a new date and location this year.

This seventh edition of the increasingly popular event, which benefits the Bob Jones Nature Center, is set for Nov. 14 (the second Saturday rather than the traditional first Saturday of November) on the chic terrace of the Marriott Solana Hotel in Westlake. Guests will still enjoy an enchanting evening including live music as they visit and stroll among various food stations to sample delicious sweets and savory samplings from upscale area restaurants.

Board Chairwoman **Debra Edmondson** explained that the new venue was chosen to accommodate the growing attendance at the event. "We expect it to be a fun evening with plenty to see and do. Ginny Mac is back with her unique brand of accordion blues and a live band for dancing. There will be great food from the Marriott and sweet tastings from local restaurants."

Carroll school board President **Chris Archer** and his wife, **Stacey Archer**, are honorary co-chairs of the event. Heading up the event committee are **Norman Lyons** and **Rattana Mao** with help from **Kelly Workman** and **Lori Palmer**. Special guest will be **Bobby Jones**, grandson of the nature center's namesake.

"This year we have stepped up the event with a new venue allowing us growth and the indoor-outdoor atmosphere, which represents the nature center. Another new element is the addition of a live auction," Executive Director **Lori Higgins** said.

Restaurants serving their signature dishes include Nothing Bundt Cakes, Taziki's Mediterranean Cafe, Oak St. Pie Co., FnG Eats, Feed Store BBQ, Tommy Tamale, Cake with a Kick, Yelibelly Chocolates and MaxFrut. And the Marriott will offer delicious food from its chef's table.

Auction swag will wow guests with hotel stays, spa packages, tickets to awesome entertainment venues, a hot air balloon ride, jewelry, gift cards and baskets, sports tickets, trail rides and more.

Bragan Foundation honors LaDainian Tomlinson Nov. 11 to aid college-bound eighth-graders

Former TCU and NFL star **LaDainian Tomlinson** is the honoree for the Lifetime Achievement Awards Gala at 6 p.m. Nov. 11 at the Omni Fort Worth Hotel. NBC5 sportscaster **Newy Scruggs** will emcee this year's gala, which is hosted by the Bobby Bragan Youth Foundation.

“I am especially excited about the opportunity to be this year's Bobby Bragan Youth Foundation honoree,” Tomlinson said in a news release. “The similarities between the Bragan Foundation and the Tomlinson's Touching Lives Foundation are amazing — improving the lives of children through education and self-esteem are an integral part of my foundation and are also clearly part of the Bobby Bragan Youth Foundation's mission.”

The former running back set an NCAA record for most rushing yards in a single game, a record that stood until 2014. He was first-team All-American, won the Doak Walker Award as the nation's best running back and was a finalist for the Heisman Trophy. Tomlinson's NFL honors included 2006 Most Valuable Player Award and impressive rushing yard and touchdown accomplishments. He is an analyst on the NFL Network.

Since 1991, the Bobby Bragan Youth Foundation has awarded \$1.7 million in college scholarships in \$2,500 increments to 695 deserving area students. Students are chosen in the eighth grade and are awarded the scholarships after they graduate and enroll in college.

Spokesman **David Hatchett** said the event was moved a day earlier to Nov. 11 because of a conflict in Tomlinson's schedule. This is the 24th year for the gala. Past football winners include Tom Landry, Roger Staubach and Gene Stallings.
